Geometry

- A. Solve real-world and mathematical problems involving area, surface area, and volume.** NY-6.G.A
1. Find area of triangles, trapezoids, and other polygons by composing into rectangles or decomposing into triangles and quadrilaterals. Apply these techniques in the context of solving real-world and mathematical problems. NY-6.G.1
 2. Find volumes of right rectangular prisms with fractional edge lengths in the context of solving real-world and mathematical problems. NY-6.G.2
 3. Draw polygons in the coordinate plane given coordinates for the vertices. Use coordinates to find the length of a side joining points with the same first coordinate or the same second coordinate. Apply these techniques in the context of solving real-world and mathematical problems. NY-6.G.3

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The Number System

5. Understand that positive and negative numbers are used together to describe quantities having opposite directions or values. Use positive and negative numbers to represent quantities in real-world contexts, explaining the meaning of 0 in each situation. [NY-6.NS.5](#)

6. Understand a rational number as a point on the number line. Use number lines and coordinate axes to represent points on a number line and in the coordinate plane with negative number coordinates. **NY-6.NS.6**
 - a. Recognize opposite signs of numbers as indicating locations on opposite sides of 0 on the number line. Recognize that the opposite of the opposite of a number is the number itself, and that 0 is its own opposite. **NY-6.NS.6.A**

Expressions, Equations, and Inequalities

A. Apply and extend previous understandings of arithmetic to algebraic expressions. **NY-6.EE.A**

1. Write and evaluate numerical expressions involving whole-number exponents. **NY-6.EE.1**
2. Write, read, and evaluate expressions in which letters stand for numbers. **NY-6.EE.2**
 - a. Write expressions that record operations with numbers and with letters standing for numbers. **NY-6.EE.2.A**
 - b. Identify parts of an expression using mathematical terms (term, coefficient, sum, difference, product, factor, and quotient); view one or more parts of an expression as a single entity. **NY-6.EE.2.B**

5. Understand solving an equation or inequality as a process of answering a question: which values from a specified set, if any, make the equation or inequality true? Use substitution to determine whether a given number in a specified set makes an equation or inequality true. [NY-6.EE.5](#)

6. Use variables to represent numbers and write expressions when solving a real-world or mathematical problem. Understand that a variable can represent an unknown number, or, depending on the purpose at hand, any number in a specified set. [NY-6.EE.6](#)

7. Solve real-world and mathematical problems by writing and solving equations of the form $x + p = q$; $x - p = q$; $px = q$; and $x/p = q$ for cases in which p , q , and x are all non-negative rational numbers. [NY-6.EE.7](#)

8. Write an inequality of the form $x > c$, $x \geq c$, $x \leq c$, or $x < c$ to represent a constraint or condition in a real-world or mathematical problem. 9. Use variables to represent two quantities in a real-world problem that change in relationship to one another. Given a verbal context and an equation, identify the dependent variable, in terms of the other quantity, thought of as the independent variable. Analyze the relationship between the dependent and independent variables using graphs and tables, and relate these to the equation. [NY-6.EE.9](#)

Statistics and Probability

A. Develop understanding of statistical variability. [NY-6.SP.A](#)

a. Recognize that a statistical question is one that anticipates variability in the data related to the question and accounts for it in the answers. [NY-6.SP.1.A](#)

b. Understand that statistics can be used to gain information about a population by examining a sample of the population; generalizations about a population from a sample are valid only if the sample is representative of that population. [NY-6.SP.1.B](#)

c. Understand that the method and sample size used to collect data for a particular question is intended to reduce the difference between a population and a sample taken from the population so valid inferences can be drawn about the population. Generate multiple samples (or simulated samples) of the same size to recognize the variation in estimates or predictions. [NY-6.SP.1.C](#)

2. Understand that a set of quantitative data collected to answer a statistical question has a distribution which can be described by its center, spread, and overall shape. [NY-6.SP.2](#)

3. Recognize that a measure of center for a quantitative data set summarizes all of its values with a single number while a measure of variation describes how its values vary with a single number. **NY-6.SP.3**

4. Display quantitative data in plots on a number line, including dot plots, and histograms. **NY-6.SP.4**
 5. Summarize quantitative data sets in relation to their context. **NY-6.SP.5**

 - b. Describe the nature of the attribute under investigation, including how it was measured and its units of measurement. **NY-6.SP.5.B**

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A. Investigate chance processes and develop, use, and evaluate probability models. **NY-6-7.SP.A**

6. Understand that the probability of a chance event is a number between 0 and 1 inclusive, that expresses the likelihood of the event occurring. Larger numbers indicate greater likelihood. A probability near 0 indicates an unlikely event, a probability around $\frac{1}{2}$ indicates an event that is neither unlikely nor likely, and a probability near 1 indicates a likely event. **NY-6.SP.6**
7. Approximate the probability of a simple event by collecting data on the chance process that produces it and observing its long-run relative frequency, and predict the approximate relative frequency given the probability. **NY-6.SP.7**
8. Develop a probability model and use it to find probabilities of simple events. Compare probabilities from a model to observed frequencies; if the agreement is not good, explain possible sources of the discrepancy. **NY-6.SP.8**
 - a. Develop a uniform probability model by assigning equal probability to all outcomes, and use the model to determine probabilities of simple events. **NY-6.SP.8.A**
 - b. Develop a probability model (which may not be uniform) by observing frequencies in data generated from a chance process **NY-6.SP.8.B**
