Counting and Cardinality

- A. Know number names and the count sequence. [NY-PK-K.CC.A](#)
 1. Count to 100 by ones and by tens. [NY-K.CC.1](#)
 2. Count to 100 by ones beginning from any given number (instead of beginning at 1). [NY-K.CC.2](#)
 3. Write numbers from 0 to 20. Represent a number of objects with a written numeral 0-20 (with 0 representing a count of no objects). [NY-K.CC.3](#)
- B. Count to tell the number of objects. [NY-PK-K.CC.B](#)
 4. Understand the relationship between numbers and quantities up to 20; connect counting to cardinality. [NY-K.CC.4](#)
 - a. When counting objects, say the number names in the standard order, pairing each object with one and only one number name and each number name with one and only one object. (1:1 correspondence) [NY-K.CC.4.A](#)
 - b. Understand that the last number name said tells the number of objects counted, (cardinality). The number of objects is the same regardless of their arrangement or the order in which they were counted. [NY-K.CC.4.B](#)
 - c. Understand the concept that each successive number name refers to a quantity that is one larger. [NY-K.CC.4.C](#)
 - d. Understand the concept of ordinal numbers (first through tenth) to describe the relative position and magnitude of whole numbers. [NY-K.CC.4.D](#)

- a. Answer counting questions using as many as 20 objects arranged in a line, a rectangular array, and a circle. Answer counting questions using as many as 10 objects in a scattered configuration. **NY-K.CC.5.A**
