Text Types and Purposes

1. Write arguments focused on discipline-specific content. [11-12.WHST.1](#)
 - a. Introduce precise, knowledgeable claim(s), establish the significance of the claim(s), distinguish the claim(s) from alternate or opposing claims, and create an organization that logically sequences the claim(s), counterclaims, reasons, and evidence. [11-12.WHST.1.A](#)

2. Write informative/explanatory texts, including the narration of historical events, scientific procedures/ experiments, or technical processes. [11-12.WHST.2](#)
