The student, for at least 40% of instructional time, asks questions, identifies problems, and plans and safely conducts classroom, laboratory, and field investigations to answer questions, explain phenomena, or design solutions using appropriate tools and models. The student is expected to: **CHEM.1**

- B.** apply scientific practices to plan and conduct descriptive, comparative, and experimental investigations and use engineering practices to design solutions to problems; **CHEM.1.B**

- C.** use appropriate safety equipment and practices during laboratory, classroom, and field investigations as outlined in Texas Education Agency-approved safety standards; **CHEM.1.C**

- D.** use appropriate tools such as Safety Data Sheets (SDS), scientific or graphing calculators, computers and probes, electronic balances, an adequate supply of consumable chemicals, and sufficient scientific glassware such as beakers, Erlenmeyer flasks, pipettes, graduated cylinders, volumetric flasks, and burettes; **CHEM.1.D**

- A.** explain the development of the Periodic Table over time using evidence such as chemical and physical properties; **CHEM.5.A**
- B.** predict the properties of elements in chemical families, including alkali metals, alkaline earth metals, halogens, noble gases, and transition metals, based on valence electrons patterns using the Periodic Table; and **CHEM.5.B**
- C.** analyze and interpret elemental data, including atomic radius, atomic mass, electronegativity, ionization energy, and reactivity to identify periodic trends. **CHEM.5.C**

The student understands the development of atomic theory and applies it to real-world phenomena. The student is expected to: **CHEM.6**

- A.** construct models using Dalton's Postulates, Thomson's discovery of electron properties, Rutherford's nuclear atom, Bohr's nuclear atom, and Heisenberg's Uncertainty Principle to show the development of modern atomic theory over time; **CHEM.6.A**
- B.** describe the structure of atoms and ions, including the masses, electrical charges, and locations of protons and neutrons in the nucleus and electrons in the electron cloud; **CHEM.6.B**
- C.** investigate the mathematical relationship between energy, frequency, and wavelength of light using the electromagnetic spectrum and relate it to the quantization of energy in the emission spectrum; **CHEM.6.C**
- D.** calculate average atomic mass of an element using isotopic composition; and **CHEM.6.D**

C. define and apply Dalton's law of partial pressure. [CHEM.10.C](#)
