Interpreting Functions

A. Understand the concept of a function and use function notation [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-IF.A](#)

1. Understand that a function from one set (called the domain) to another set (called the range) assigns to each element of the domain exactly one element of the range. If f is a function and x is an element of its domain, then $f(x)$ denotes the output of f corresponding to the input x . The graph of f is the graph of the equation $y = f(x)$. 2. Use function notation, evaluate functions for inputs in their domains, and interpret statements that use function notation in terms of a context. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-IF.A.2](#)

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Building Functions

A. Build a function that models a relationship between two quantities [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-BF.A](#)

1. Write a function that describes a relationship between two quantities [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-BF.A.1](#)
- a. Determine an explicit expression, a recursive process, or steps for calculation from a context. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-BF.A.1A](#)
 - b. Combine standard function types using arithmetic operations. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-BF.A.1B](#)

3. Identify the effect on the graph of replacing $f(x)$ by $f(x) + k$, $k f(x)$, $f(kx)$, and $f(x + k)$ for specific values of k (both positive and negative); find the value of k given the graphs. Experiment with cases and illustrate an explanation of the effects on the graph using technology. Include recognizing even and odd functions from their graphs and algebraic expressions for them.  4. Find inverse functions. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-BF.B.4](#)
 - a. Solve an equation of the form $f(x) = c$ for a simple function f that has an inverse and write an expression for the inverse. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-BF.B.4A](#)
 - b. (+) Verify by composition that one function is the inverse of another. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-BF.B.4B](#)

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Linear, Quadratic, and Exponential Models

A. Construct and compare linear, quadratic, and exponential models and solve problems CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-LE.A

1. Distinguish between situations that can be modeled with linear functions and with exponential functions. CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-LE.A.1
 - a. Prove that linear functions grow by equal differences over equal intervals, and that exponential functions grow by equal factors over equal intervals. CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-LE.A.1A
 - b. Recognize situations in which one quantity changes at a constant rate per unit interval relative to another. CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-LE.A.1B
 - c. Recognize situations in which a quantity grows or decays by a constant percent rate per unit interval relative to another. CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-LE.A.1C
2. Construct linear and exponential functions, including arithmetic and geometric sequences, given a graph, a description of a relationship, or two input-output pairs (include reading these from a table). CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-LE.A.2
3. Observe using graphs and tables that a quantity increasing exponentially eventually exceeds a quantity increasing linearly, quadratically, or (more generally) as a polynomial function. CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-LE.A.3
4. For exponential models, express as a logarithm the solution to $ab^{ct} = d$ where a , c , and d are numbers and the base b is 2, 10, or e ; evaluate the logarithm using technology. CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-LE.A.4

Trigonometric Functions

A. Extend the domain of trigonometric functions using the unit circle CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.A

1. Understand radian measure of an angle as the length of the arc on the unit circle subtended by the angle. CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.A.1
2. Explain how the unit circle in the coordinate plane enables the extension of trigonometric functions to all real numbers, interpreted as radian measures of angles traversed counterclockwise around the unit circle. CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.A.2
3. (+) Use special triangles to determine geometrically the values of sine, cosine, tangent for $\pi/3$, $\pi/4$ and $\pi/6$, and use the unit circle to express the values of sine, cosine, and tangent for $\pi-x$, $\pi+x$, and $2\pi-x$ in terms of their values for x , where x is any real number. 4. (+) Use the unit circle to explain symmetry (odd and even) and periodicity of trigonometric functions. CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.A.4

B. Model periodic phenomena with trigonometric functions CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.B

5. Choose trigonometric functions to model periodic phenomena with specified amplitude, frequency, and midline. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.B.5](#)
 6. (+) Understand that restricting a trigonometric function to a domain on which it is always increasing or always decreasing allows its inverse to be constructed. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.B.6](#)
 7. (+) Use inverse functions to solve trigonometric equations that arise in modeling contexts; evaluate the solutions using technology, and interpret them in terms of the context. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.B.7](#)
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C. Prove and apply trigonometric identities [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.C](#)

8. Prove the Pythagorean identity $\sin^2(\theta) + \cos^2(\theta) = 1$ and use it to find $\sin(\theta)$, $\cos(\theta)$, or $\tan(\theta)$ given $\sin(\theta)$, $\cos(\theta)$, or $\tan(\theta)$ and the quadrant of the angle. [CCSS.MATH.CONTENT.HSF-TF.C.8](#)
